

## Mrs. Jones' Second Grade Language Arts March $9^{\text {th }}-20^{\text {th }}$

Reading: Our next reading selection, How to Read a Story, will be a procedural text. It will give us directions for readers to follow. We will learn about the main topic and details, understand steps that show order, and ways visuals and words help readers understand the text. Students will read to make smart guesses, or inferences, about things the author does not say. Students will use clues in the text and pictures to help as you read.

Vocabulary: Please check out the story vocabulary words below. Students will continue to use the glossary to discover word meanings and how they are used in the context of the story.

Homework: Review words and definitions each night.
clue- information that helps you find an answer cozy- something or someplace that is comfortable disturb- to bother someone or thing pause- to stop what you are doing for a short time rattled- to make many short, shaking noises
sense- something that is easy to understand steaming- very hot
tackled- to push the person to the ground

High-Frequency Words: One way to increase reading fluency is for students to have a healthy working knowledge of sight words that are common in everyday reading. Please have your child practice these words so they will be successful in our oral reading for class and their independent reading for Accelerated Reader.

Grammar: Students will begin to distinguish between singular or plural noun. They will continue to use proper nouns and pronouns correctly in sentences. Students are continuing to identify, name, and generate different nouns in our writing. Students should be able to explain words that name a person, place, thing, or animal are called a noun. Students can explain the difference between common and proper nouns. Students will write proper nouns correctly with a capital letter in sentences and answers. Students will continue to identify and create exclamatory (exclamation!), declarative (statement . ), and interrogative (question?) sentences. Continue to talk with your student about how a sentence begins, the word order, and how the sentence should end. Point out these two types of sentences in the text of books or newsprint that you read together. SOL 2.11
